

National Director of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan,
“THAT’S NOT US!”

We are sure you’ve seen rash, illegal, and cowardly behavior blamed on “the Ku Klux Klan” as if “the klan” is one organization, right? What the media doesn’t tell you is that the name “ku klux klan” is in the public domain so in effect anyone can use the name. **Anyone!** They can use it for good reasons or they can use it for bad reasons. There are around 200 different Klan groups in the nation. Nearly all are locally based, of these groups only a half dozen or so at the most are regionally based. These “local” groups remain limited to a small area because they want to do things their own way. They all use the terminology and ceremony of the 1920’s klan and are staunchly “fraternity styled”. They are not politically focused and resemble a club. The average size of these “klan clubs” are 6-15. There are perhaps a half a dozen regional Klan groups with an average membership of 50-75. Usually they are led by sincerely motivated individuals. However, because they have no national affiliation, their growth, activities, and goals are limited.

When we talk about “the ku klux klan” we are in fact speaking of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, also called The Knights Party, or just simply, The Knights. The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, is a legitimate Klan organization. When we say we are the *oldest, largest, and most professional white rights organization in America* we aren’t just repeating a slogan. It is true. So while some may use the name...we are the real thing. Nearly all other Klan groups “add something” to their names, so they are called the , so-and-so, (American, National, Imperial, etc.) “Knights of the Ku Klux Klan”. A few are so bold to even try to use our name illegally (**Knights of the Ku Klux Klan** is copyrighted and is supposed to be used exclusively by us.)

Let’s look at the old adage, “Commonsense isn’t common to everybody.”, and see how this cliché relates to these reckless and thoughtless accusations & indictments that various groups, agencies, and news sources weave into their stories by proxy in an effort to deliberately misrepresent the Knights Party and what we stand for.

First of all, The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is a law abiding, 100% legal organization. On our application it states, *“I understand that The Knights Party is legal and law abiding and that I will never be asked to commit an unlawful act..”* Also it states, *“We are a Christian organization and in spite of what enemies of the Klan say or in spite of those who appear on talk shows who claim they are Klansmen and Klanswomen, we are nonviolent and won’t allow such behavior.”*

The Knights Party did away with the robes & hoods and cross lighting ceremonies across the country before 1999. Now the robe & hood are only worn for a single cross lighting ceremony that is conducted just one night a year, and then only at National Headquarters in Harrison, Arkansas. All other cross lighting ceremonies are forbidden to be held by the Knights Party associates, regardless of rank or commission. Because of our policy, it goes without saying that we unquestionably never “burn crosses” in peoples yards- this is illegal and we are law abiding. Besides, even if it were legal we still wouldn’t do it because it serves no purpose other than to disparage others. We on the other hand, are concerned with raising our people up. Furthermore, as far as the robe & hood goes, Knights Party associates only wear it for the above mentioned single cross lighting ceremony that is conducted annually at National Headquarters in Harrison, Arkansas- so it without saying that the groups on courthouse steps of the Jerry Springer show are not us.

Secondly, we want to state for the record, off the record, and on both sides of the record, that we do not endorse hatred. It is hypocritical for one to think a black, Asian, Mexican or any other person should be praised for being loyal to their heritage. Yet a white person can feel the same sense of pride and be criticized for it. It doesn’t make sense.

Our philosophy is: ***Equal Rights for All, and Special Privileges for None!***

We are not Klansmen and Klanswomen because we hate anyone. We belong to The Knights because we dream of a better world for our children - a safe and secure world. It is not hatred, but rather the glimmer of hope in the eyes of our children that motivates us. We belong to The Knights because we love our people - yes, even those who hate us. Klansmen and Klanswomen throughout the nation are at work distributing literature, passing out cards, and talking to friends and neighbors...always spreading the good news of white Christian revival...not because they hate you, but because they love you.

Our volunteer staff at the national office is committed to the unity of all white Christians. They work hard building The Knights into a true political party - always encouraging the membership - reaching out to the undecided –again, not because they hate you, but because they love you. The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, to put a twist on the cliché, is a love group; not a hate group. We love America and the Christian foundation of our nation. We love our white brothers and sisters world wide and we recognize the contributions they have made to civilization. We also realize that our nation's future and in fact all white Christian civilization is in jeopardy. Pastor Robb and The Knights are here to unite our people and to raise a standard in the land, to pull our people out of the downward spiral that almost everyone knows we're in, but refuses to openly acknowledge it. I hope you will carefully view our website with an open mind and consider what part you can play in bringing a message of hope and deliverance to our people. Let Pastor Robb know that you are a proud white Christian and that our cause is in your prayers. Together we can make a difference.

Since we've established the fact that "The Knights" are is a law abiding, 100% legal organization that doesn't wear the traditional get-up except for one night a year for the annual cross lighting ceremony in Harision, AR, then we know several things. The first and foremost is that The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan does not burn crosses in people's yards. Although sometimes those who are trying to act like the Hollywood created Klan will burn a cross in someone's yard as a prank. This is wrong and is not condoned by The Knights.

Usually, however, the prank is actually a means of getting sympathy support from the community. There have been many incidences in which nonwhites would burn a cross on their own lawn and then blame the Klan for it. These cases make headline news. But when the so-called victims are found out to be the actual perpetrators, the story is usually found in small print, buried deep within the newspaper somewhere.

This may sound far-fetch, but consider the following incidents of like nature:

April 27, 2005 – A 19-year-old Black woman, who police say wanted to convince her parents that the university was unsafe, was arrested Tuesday for sending threatening hate mail to Black and Latino students at Trinity International University. Alicia Hardin, suffering from homesickness, wanted her parents to think that Trinity, in Deerfield, Ill., was a dangerous place for minorities – a place where minorities are harassed by other students, according to Bannockburn Police. So, she sent three letters to fellow students, which led to an investigation by the FBI. Police officials say that Hardin, who is being charged with disorderly conduct and a felony hate crime, confessed to authorities on Monday. If convicted, she could face up to five years in prison for the hoax. Over the last two weeks, Hardin sent two letters to Black students and one to a Latina. The third letter threatened bodily harm. "I saw you in the chapel ... I had my gun in my pocket, but I wouldn't shoot," read one of the letters, the *Chicago Sun Times* reported Wednesday. The letter prompted campus administrators to move more than 40 students to a nearby hotel to ensure their safety.

April 2005 - Everett Washington - Wes Washington and Crissy Kitchel couldn't believe the destruction or the time the crooks spent burglarizing and then trashing their Everett house. "When you look at it, whether is race or personal, it's still hate. You can't tear apart someone's house like this and not call it hate," said Kitchel last week. KKK, swastikas and the "N" word on a smashed mirror all pointed to a hate crime. Graffiti saying **KKK** were found in a house. Neighbors demonstrated and collected money. It was a fake hate crime staged by the family's son and his friends. Police say the teen and two friends planned the burglary, then made it look like a hate crime to cover their tracks. The two other teens are also under arrest - including one who used to live with the couple until they kicked him out for stealing.

April 2004 Des Moines - The Hermasillo family thought it was being targeted by white racist since KKK and Swastika where found painted on walls in their home. It turned out these signs had been painted by **Luis Silva**, another latino who had lived with them

March 2004 Ashburn, Georgia - third Racist hoax in the US this Month! A Black couple, **Patrick** and **Shanda Burwell** blamed savage white racists for burning down their home. In fact, they set the fire to collect insurance money. It might not have been the first time either.

June 2003 - Minnesota - Thomas Charles Glander, a white Bethel Seminary student, was charged with painting anti-black racial slurs on his own pick up truck and making a false report to the police. He wanted to raise awareness on racism.

In 2002, an Arizona State University student was charged on suspicion of faking anti-Muslim hate crimes because he was upset Muslims were being treated unfairly after the Sept. 11 attacks. He now faces trial for the charge of reporting a false crime and one year in jail if convicted.

In 2001, a gay student at the College of New Jersey confessed to sending death threats to himself and a gay student group. He was suspended from campus during the investigation and charged with a felony on suspicion of filing false police reports and harassment.

In 1998, North Carolina - members of Duke University's Black Student Alliance claimed they did not do something they later admitted to, a symbolic lynching. A black baby doll was found hanging from a tree where they were later supposed to hold a protest about the school's inability to improve race relations on campus, and they tarred a bench to enhance support for their agenda. The group was ordered to pay clean-up cost.
